An addendum to Rogers comment about the ride to Richmond for Dairy Queen. On our journey we took the backroads to Winchester, then on to Irvin. During the ride I began to feel bad, and didn't feel good about the ride. We stopped at the Shell Station just outside of Irvin for a break. After taking in some water and a potty break I informed our riders that I was calling it a day and heading home. 3 other riders decided to ride with me, while a couple of others continued on to the Natural Bridge area. About a mile out of Irvin, for some reason I call a divine intervention, I looked downward through the front forks tunnel on the right. I noticed a bolt sticking out that I knew was not there earlier. We pulled off the roadway while I inspected my finding. To my amazement, the bolt was barely attached to the upper support brace for my front forks. There are 2 bolts, the lower one was completely gone, and the remaining bolt was holding on by 2 threads. Alan and I had just had the Traxxion front suspension put on our bikes. I can only surmise that the mechanics failed to tighten\torque the bolts properly after the install. I am thankful to have been safe and limped to Richmond Honda where we found the replacement bolts I needed and prevented what could have been a total disaster. The following day I took the front end completely apart and then torqued every bolt back in place to the proper settings. Please feel free to ask me about it if you have any questions.

Hello Fellow Wingers, 09/09/17

September is here and daylight hours are getting shorter. I was on a ride just the other day late in the afternoon, shadows were heavy and the sunlight was in my eyes when I was heading west. I had just passed the Woodford Reserve distillery and was heading towards Frankfort when I hit a spot where the sun was blinding me. As I was rounding a small curve I heard hoof clatter on the road surface and grabbed some brake to slow, and out of the shadows a small white tail deer ran in front of me. I think I missed hitting that deer by a fraction of an inch and it actually felt like I ticked one hind hoof with my front tire. Well needless to say that woke me up real quick and for the rest of the ride I counted about 8 deer along the roadway. I thought I would include a deer safety article I read recently on the Geico Insurance Web site.

## By Dawn McCaslin Deer Safety: Tips for Avoiding a Collision

Like a scene straight out of a sports car commercial, you're driving along a winding road in the dead of night, the eerie glow from your headlights meeting the narrow asphalt, when suddenly, two green eyes flash in the darkness ahead – and a deer steps onto the roadway.

Unlike the television ad when the driver swerves wildly around the animal and then speeds off carelessly into the blackness, encountering a deer while you're on the road can be dangerous and scary. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), large animal-vehicle collisions resulted in an average of 187 fatalities in recent years.

So, what can you do to stay safe during deer season?

Read on to learn the latest statistics and a few tips for making your ride through deer country as safe as possible.

## **Deer Statistics**

- Dawn and dusk are the times you are most likely to encounter deer along the roadside.
- Deer breeding season runs from October through early January, and during this time they are highly active and on the move. This is when deer-vehicle collisions are at their peak.
- Though deer may wander into suburban neighborhoods, they are most frequently found on the outskirts of town and in heavily wooded areas.
- As pack animals, deer almost never travel alone. If you see one deer, you can bet that there are others nearby.

## **Preventive Techniques**

- ☐ The two most important ways to avoid a deer-vehicle collision are: slow down and SLOW DOWN. If you are driving through an area known for high deer populations, slow down and observe the speed limit. The more conservative you are with your speed, the more time you will have to brake if an animal darts into your path.
- Watch for the shine of eyes along the roadside and immediately begin to slow.
- Use your high beams whenever the road is free of oncoming traffic. This will increase your visibility and give you more time to react.
- Deer can become mesmerized by steady, bright lights so if you see one frozen on the road, slow down and flash your lights. Some experts recommend one long blast of the horn to scare them out of the road, as well.
- Pay close attention to caution signs indicating deer or other large animals. These signs are specifically placed in high-traffic areas where road crossings are frequent.

☐ If you're on a multi-lane road, drive in the center lane to give as much space to grazing deer as possible.

## **Encountering a Deer**

■ Never swerve to avoid a deer in the road. Swerving can confuse the deer on where to run.
Swerving can also cause a head-on collision with oncoming vehicles, take you off the roadway into a tree or a ditch, and greatly increase the chances of serious injuries.

■ Deer are unpredictable creatures, and one that is calmly standing by the side of the road may suddenly leap into the roadway without warning. Slowing down when you spot a deer is the best way to avoid a collision. However, if one does move into your path, maintain control and do your best to brake and give the deer time to get out of your way.

■ Don't rely on hood whistles or other devices designed to scare off deer. These have not been proven to work.

If you do collide with a deer (or large animal), call emergency services if injuries are involved, or the local police if no one is injured, but damage has been caused to your property or someone else's. Never touch an animal that is in the roadway. Report the incident to your insurance company as soon as possible.

Unlike that fictional driver from the car commercial, knowing what to do when you encounter a large animal on or near the roadway can be a life-saver. Keeping calm and driving smart improve your chances of avoiding a collision and staying safe on the road. Safe travels!

# Happy September fellow Goldwingers!!!

Well September is here and we are entering my favorite riding season. Safety is our prime concern so this month I will complete Wes Siler's advice on tips to avoid the top ten motor-cycle accidents. In August we discussed the first five and this month we will wrap it up with the last five. Thanks to Wes Siler from <u>Ride Apart</u> for his insight.

Here we go.....

# 6: Your Riding Buddies Are Idiots

You've seen it happen. A group is out for a ride when one of them stops suddenly or something similar. His buddy is too busy daydreaming to realize and hits him from behind. This has happened to us; it can happen to anyone.

**How To Avoid It**: Make sure everyone is aware of proper group riding etiquette and knows to ride in a staggered formation. You'd be amazed how many people are unaware of this simple technique. Doing so increases vision and moves bikes out of line with each other, meaning a temporary lapse in attention wont' result in a collision. Pick smarter riding buddies or do what I do: ride alone.

## 7: You Locked the Front Brake

Oh no, a deer/cute girl/cop/stopped traffic. You grab a fistful of front brake and, next thing you know, you're lying on the ground, watching your bike cartwheel down the street.

**How To Avoid It**: Learn to use your front brake. It might seem counterintuitive, but that front brake is the most powerful and difficult-to-master component on your motorcycle; it can alter your speed much more quickly than your engine.

If you're just learning to ride, have simply never mastered this skill or bought a new bike and need to learn it, find a big, empty parking lot and start practicing.

From a set speed (say, 30 mph), start braking at a certain mark, then repeat ad infinitum until you've reduced your braking distance as much as possible. You should be able to feel the tire on the very edge of locking up and the rear wheel lifting off the ground. Then go and practice at higher and higher speeds until you can employ the maximum braking ability of your motorcycle reliably and safe.

Or just buy a bike with ABS, remember you have it, and squeeze the lever as hard as you can when you need to make an emergency stop.

# 8 A Car Opened Its Door

The biggest gap in traffic was between a line of parked cars and a stationary line of active traffic. So you go scooting through it when, all of a sudden, Nathan-no-look swings his door wide open right in front of you.

How to Avoid It: Never, ever, ever, ever ride between an active traffic lane and parked cars. Not just because of the opening doors thing, but because pedestrians step out, cars pull out so they can see, and for a million other reasons. Just don't do it. If you do, somehow, find yourself in a door-opening situation though, follow all the advice above and brake as hard as possible. Even if a collision is inevitable, shedding even a small fraction of your speed can really help.

Cyclists call the area next to parked cars, within a door's width "The Death Zone" for a reason.

The end of the Blue Ridge Parkway, all 469 miles of it. It's a shame we didn't get to see more of it. That's alright, another day!



# 9: It's Slippery!

Stuff is coming out of the sky! That stuff is cold, wet and, surprise,



slippery. Listen to Douglas Adams and don't panic.

**How to Avoid It**: Does your bike have decent tires on it or were you silly and decided that running track rubber on the road was a good idea? Hint: it's not. So long as you're running reasonable tires and those tires aren't worn out, you'll be surprised at how well a motorcycle does in wet or even snowy conditions. Just slow down and be as smooth as possible on the controls.

In the wet, stuff like manhole covers become super, extra slippery and you'll need to watch out for oil and diesel on the road as well. Look for patches of rainbow and avoid those. If it hasn't rained for a while, the first hour or so of rainfall is the most treacherous; it lifts all the oils and whatnot out of the pavement, floating it on top. Treat yourself to a hot cup of coffee and wait for a solid downpour to wash all that junk away.

Also beware of the limited visibility rain creates for other drivers and their general ineptitude; car drivers don't seem to understand that slippery conditions necessitate longer following distances and earlier braking.

Ron Haslam advocates keeping revs up in the wet. The thinking is that, should your rear spin up, you'll be using a smaller amount of throttle opening, allowing you to regain traction much easier than if you're riding at 30mph in 6th, at wide open throttle.

## 10: The Most Common Bike Accident

According to the 1981 Hurt Report — the largest study ever conducted on motorcycle accident causation **How to Avoid It**: Don't drink and ride.
